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Regent House School







Since Regent House School was founded in the imposing Regency mansion in 1924, it has grown not only in size but also in terms of success.

After significant investment in the Regent House campus, our extensive resources include specialist rooms for all practical subjects, including five IT rooms. Our music and drama facilities offer rehearsal space, a recording studio and a performance theatre.

With our focus on high levels of achievement, we have introduced a rigorous assessment and reporting cycle that analyses pupil performance every 8-10 weeks. Our Heads of Department continually review what is being taught in order to improve pupil performance. Where pupils require additional support, our extensive mentoring programme guides those pupils towards their goals in partnership with their teachers and parents.

We have a long and successful sporting tradition and strongly emphasise the value and benefits of participating in school sport. We are extremely proud of our sporting culture and are fortunate to have many talented young sports men and women who participate on a week to week basis for the school. Our sports facilities are excellent inside and out. They include a gymnasium, sports hall, two fitness suites, three rugby pitches and a synthetic hockey pitch.

At Regent House we have a very strong pastoral ethos. Staff strive to build positive relationships with students in a supportive environment that results in a genuine sense of belonging.

At the same time we set high standards of behaviour that students understand and can respect, both in class and around the school. Our approach focuses on knowing each and every pupil and understanding their personal needs, aptitudes and aspirations.

We offer an exciting extra-curricular programme that enriches pupils lives and enables them to feel involved and valued. Staff devote their time and energy to create opportunities that make the school experience memorable as well as academically successful.

To all this we add a range of local and global opportunities that will provide them with greater awareness and understanding. Recent opportunities include ski trips and sports tours as well as educational trips to London, Paris, New York and Abu Dhabi with our F1 in Schools programme.





School Life

School begins each morning at 8.50am with Form Class and each year group attends a morning Assembly once a week.

A typical Junior School day is shown to the right.

Morning Assembly and the specifications for Religious Education are entirely non-denominational. Parents who prefer that their children do not attend morning Assembly or Religious Education have the statutory right of withdrawal. Arrangements can be made with the Headmaster.

There are 9 teaching periods of 35 minutes each day, a mid-morning break of 15 minutes and a break of 40 minutes for lunch. School finishes at 3.20pm.

Senior School break is held at 10:50am and Senior lunch at 12:55pm to ensure all pupils enjoy a pleasant break and lunch time experience.

Organisation of Classes

Years 8 - 10

Pupils are allocated to seven classes which ensure a reasonable mix of pupils from different primary schools.

Years 11 - 14

Each pupil's programme of classes is governed by the options chosen.

House System

For the purpose of competition in games and other whole school activities the school is divided into four houses; Castlereagh, Clandeboye, Scrabo and Strangford. Pupils are allocated to a house when they join us.

Curriculum

Enabling all pupils to achieve their academic potential through a broad and balanced curriculum.

Pupils are offered a broad, balanced and relevant curriculum which will empower them to recognise and achieve their potential and to make informed and responsible decisions throughout their lives.

Most pupils in Key Stage 4 study nine or ten GCSE subjects but programmes may be adapted to meet the needs of individual pupils.

In Key Stage 5 most pupils study four AS level subjects in Year 13 and three A level subjects in Year 14. Pupils also access an extensive choice of Physical Education options, a comprehensive Careers Education programme and a wide and varied General Studies programme.

Academic Achievement

Regent House is a school with high expectations for all, where the school community is challenged to aspire to excellence in an inclusive, supportive and respectful environment.

To promote high achievement and regular communication with parents we have introduced an assessment and reporting cycle that analyses pupil performance approximately every 8-10 weeks. Our Heads of Department have carefully designed these informative assessments to assist a continuous review of what is being taught and to improve

information on pupil performance.

Where pupils require additional support, our extensive mentoring programme guides those pupils towards their goals in partnership with their teachers and parents.

Public Examination Results 2014-2015

At A level 21 students gained at least 3 A grades.

At AS level 31 students gained at least 3 A grades with 13 students attaining 4 A grades.

At GCSE 50 pupils gained at least 9 A grades with seven pupils gaining at least 9 A* grades.

51% of all GCSE grades awarded last year to Regent House pupils were at grades A or A*.

67 pupils achieved passes in at least 8 subjects at A^* or A.

Individual Pupil Success

Three of our pupils excelled within the 2015 CCEA GCSE examinations and were placed in the top 3 high achieving pupils in individual subjects.

In Chemistry Chloe McMurran was placed first in Northern Ireland and Stewart Rosell was placed second. In Biology Rachel Mooney was placed joint third whilst in Geography, Phoebe McFerran was placed fourth with Chloe McMurran placed seventh.

A Positive Community

A caring and stimulating environment encouraging respect for all.

Our established links with all primary schools in the catchment area ensures that our pastoral care programme begins while pupils are still in primary school. Pastoral staff liaise closely with the feeder schools to facilitate a smooth transition to grammar school.

All our teachers have a pastoral care role but in addition, there is a professionally trained team of dedicated teachers. This team coordinates a pastoral programme both informally and through the formal series of Learning for Life and Work classes which are timetabled for each pupil throughout the school.

Through this programme teachers strive to create a supportive environment in which all pupils can develop the social and personal skills necessary to play a confident and responsible role in society. Therefore, although Regent House is large there is a caring attitude among staff and pupils, and as a result the school has a pleasant and happy atmosphere.

Heads of Junior, Middle and Senior School oversee the pastoral provision at each key stage whilst each Year group has two Year Teachers who look after the welfare and progress of pupils within their allocation. There are also Form Tutors who look after individual classes. A Special Educational Needs coordinator ensures that individual education plans are put in place where appropriate, through consultation with feeder schools, parents, teachers and the relevant agencies. In this way, it is our aim that the needs of each individual pupil receive attention.

To the same end, parents are warmly encouraged to meet with the Year Staff, Heads of School, or the Vice-Principal (Pastoral), to discuss their children's progress. Parents' meetings are also held on an annual basis for each year group.

As a large school we employ a Matron, who is a fully qualified nurse and can deal with all physical ailments and we also have the services of part-time pupil counsellors.

If you have any concerns about your child's safety, the school has a Designated Teacher, Mrs Haugh, who has specific responsibility for Child Protection. If Mrs Haugh is unavailable, pupils, staff or parents should contact Mrs Sloan or Mr Matchett.

Careers Education

At Regent House we recognise the importance of high quality Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance.

In today's complex, competitive and rapidly changing world we provide a high quality Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance programme which meets the individual needs and requirements of all of our pupils.

Our main objective is to enable pupils to become effective career decision makers, empowered to manage their own career development successfully and confidently.


Employability classes are provided for all Year 8 – 12 pupils and a variety of careers workshops and talks are given to all Year 13 and 14 pupils as part of the General Studies Programme. Also provided are individualised personal careers advice, psychometric tests matching skills and qualities to suitable career paths, personal career planning (including progress files), assistance with all aspects of UCAS, work experience, practice interviews, a variety of talks and visits, an excellent careers library and advice on career pathways leading to employment.

We believe that contact with parents is essential and the Head of Careers is available to meet parents as required. Year 12 Subject Choice and UCAS Information Evenings are held annually to communicate information and advice to parents. A Subject Choice Information Evening is also provided on an annual basis for parents of Year 10 pupils.

Additional support is available through the Careers Service, who interview all Year 12 pupils, many Year 13 & 14 pupils and attend Year 10 & 12 Parent information afternoons. Further assistance from parents and past pupils enables Mock University Interviews for Year 14 pupils.

Close links are maintained with local employers, FE colleges and universities who not only assist with work experience and taster courses but support our annual careers convention. The Careers Department also works closely with other local schools as part of the Area Learning Partnership promoting STEM subjects and running the yearly UKCAT Kaplan admission test preparation course.

Sport and PE

We have a long and successful sporting tradition and strongly emphasise the value and benefits of participating in school sport.

We seek to achieve our sporting aims through providing opportunities for all pupils to participate in a broad and balanced range of physical activities delivered both in curricular and extra-curricular time. As well as timetabled Physical Education, pupils are encouraged to attend after school coaching sessions and Saturday morning fixtures. All pupils have the opportunity to participate in at least one activity of their choice, with many choosing to participate in multiple activities.

Music

Our Music Department provides extensive opportunities for our young people to express and develop their musical talents in a wide range of choirs, bands and orchestras with junior and senior groups being divided usually by the Grade 5 level of ability as opposed to division by age.

As membership of all groups continues to expand, so too does repertoire; in recent years the classical music performed has included works by Vivaldi, Bach, Handel, Haydn and Kodaly, together with Irish premier performances of works by composers

like Kevin Norbury and John Rutter, while popular arrangements of works by Lennon and McCartney, John Williams and James Horner have become firm favourites of both audiences and performers.

Highlights of the year include the annual performance of Handel's Messiah in St Mark's Parish Church at Christmas, a Spring Concert involving approximately 350 students, numerous "Musical Programmes" provided for local and national charities and various national and international choral and wind band competitions.



Drama

Each year the Drama Department performs a senior and a junior play which showcase the amazing talent within our pupil body. Recent productions include the junior performance of Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory and the senior productions of Pygmalion and Fiddler on the Roof.

The junior Drama club is led by Sixth Form Theatre Studies students and welcomes all Year 8 pupils who want to hone their drama skills in preparation for auditioning for the junior play.

Participation in the school production is a wonderful

experience for everyone. Up to one hundred people are involved on stage, in the band and in the technical and support crews. The joy of creating something magical is a life-changing experience, and gives the performers a new-found confidence in themselves. There is no better feeling than receiving the applause of the audience after two hours of exhilarating theatre. Great camaraderie is fostered, and new friendships made. 


























Enriching Opportunities

Recently pupils have participated in ski trips and sports tours to Italy as well as educational trips to London, Paris, New York and to Abu Dhabi with F1 in Schools.
